WRITING TIPS FOR PARENTS/EDUCATORS:

At any age, writing a story is a process! But with children especially, it's important to approach writing in a way that makes the process enjoyable and stress-free, and will ultimately help them build their confidence as a storyteller and lifelong writer.

Tip #1: Take your time!

Don't worry if your child needs several days to think about ideas for their story and organize them. Perhaps one day could be dedicated to brainstorming story ideas, then another could be breaking up the story into a beginning middle, and end. Taking time to break down the writing process into separate pieces will not only make the writing process more manageable, but will also help your child develop a deep understanding of all the parts of writing a great story.

Tip #2: Make a list of words

Spend a writing session identifying the words your child does not know how to write yet but would like to include in the story. Write down the words together to have as a reference when writing the story at a later time. Having a list to look off of while writing will not only help to build your child's vocabulary, but will also allow your child to focus on the story rather than worry about spelling.


